### Freshmen:

\*Freshmen Meet-n-Greet Individual meetings are currently underway and it sounds as though our freshmen are off to a good start.

\*The PSAT will be given at Laconia on Oct. 10<sup>th</sup>. Students have received information on this opportunity and may sign up in the counseling office if interested. A limited number of tests are available.

\*The PSAT will be given at Laconia on Oct. 10<sup>th</sup>. Students have received information on this opportunity and may sign up in the counseling office if interested. A limited number of tests are available. Participation in this test can qualify junior students for the National Merit Scholarship program.

## AP Scholars

Thirteen students at Laconia High School have earned AP Scholar Awards in recognition of their exceptional achievement on AP Exams.

The College Board's Advanced Placement Program® (AP®) provides willing and academically prepared students with the opportunity to take rigorous college-level courses while still in high school, and to earn college credit, advanced placement, or both for successful performance on the AP Exams. About 22 percent of the 2.2 million students worldwide who took AP Exams performed at a sufficiently high level to also earn an AP Scholar Award.

The College Board recognizes several levels of achievement based on students' performance on AP Exams.

Three students qualified for the AP Scholar with Distinction Award by earning an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams throughout his or her high school career. These students are 2018 graduates Zachary Foth, Sarah Laudolf, and Brady Madigan.

Five students qualified for the AP Scholar with Honor Award by earning an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams. These students are 2018 graduates Alyssa Jodarski, Cormae Madigan, Samuel Oehmcke, Bekah Tilstra and current senior Benjamin Pokorny.

Five students qualified for the AP Scholar Award by completing three or more AP Exams with scores of 3 or higher. The AP Scholars are 2018 graduates Samuel Bauer, Casey Hamm, Kayla Zimmerman and current seniors Hailey Bartz and Alex Turner.

Through 34 different college-level courses and exams, AP provides willing and academically prepared students with the opportunity to earn college credit or advanced placement and stand out in the college admission process. Each exam is developed by a committee of college and university faculty and AP teachers, ensuring that AP Exams are aligned with the same high standards expected by college faculty at some of the nation's leading liberal arts and research institutions. More than 3600 colleges and universities annually receive AP scores. Most four-year colleges in the United States provide credit and/or advanced placement for qualifying exam scores. Research consistently shows that AP students who score a 3 or higher on AP Exams (based on a scale from 1 to 5, with 5 being the highest) typically experience greater academic success in college and have higher college graduation rates than students who do not participate in AP.

## ANNUAL NOTICE HOMELESS CHILDREN & YOUTH

The McKinney-Vento Act defines homeless children and youth as:

- Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, and includes children and youth who are:
  - sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason
  - living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations
  - living in emergency or transitional shelters
  - abandoned in hospitals
  - living in a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings
  - living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings;
  - and migratory children who qualify as homeless because the children are living in circumstances described above

If you are personally aware of or are acquainted with any children or youth who may qualify according to the above criteria, the Rosendale-Brandon School District provides the following assurances to parents and guardians of homeless children and youth and unaccompanied homeless youth:

- The child or youth shall be immediately enrolled and allowed to fully participate in school, even if unable to produce records normally required for enrollment (e.g., academic records, immunization and other required health records, proof of residency, or other documentation) or has missed application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness.
- Homeless children and youths are not stigmatized or segregated on the basis of their status as homeless and have full and equal educational and related opportunities.
- Meaningful opportunities to participate in the education of their children including special notices of events, parent-teacher conferences, newsletters, and access to student records.
- Immediate enrollment and transportation to the school of origin. "School of origin" means the school that a child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled, including a preschool.
- Written explanation of any decisions related to school selection or enrollment made by the school, the local educational agency, or the State educational agency involved, including the rights of the parent, guardian, or unaccompanied youth to appeal and receive prompt resolution of such decisions.
