Did you know that with the last biennial budget, the State of Wisconsin made it possible for residents with an Associate's Degree to be a substitute teacher? Residents with a Bachelor's Degree are still eligible, as well. With having either one of these degrees, you would also need to attend a one-day training with CESA 6 in Oshkosh and then apply for your substitute license. After receiving your license, you can start working for the Rosendale-Brandon School District as a substitute teacher.
