Mr. Milton worked in the Rosendale-Brandon School District for 40 years serving as a teacher, principal, and superintendent. Mr. Milton retired in 2002. 



Mental Health Matters

Improving Mental Health Education in the RBSD

What is AMHE?

For the past year, educators in the RBSD have been working to improve the mental health education for students in the RBSD as part of Allies in Mental Health Education (AMHE). AMHE is a partnership between schools and CESAs 6 and 7 that was formed with a mission to improve systems to better support the mental health and wellness of students.



The RBSD AMHE team is committed to developing schools that support the health and well-being of all learners through a collaborative model that includes school, family, and community by increasing awareness and willingness to collaborate, plan and implement multi-level systems of support. The vision of this team is to collaborate within The RBSD schools and community to support ALL learners' mental health so that they feel safe, supported, accepted and valued and have the tools to facilitate their own lifelong health and wellness.

During the 2018-19 school year, the AMHE team surveyed staff on their perceptions of social-emotional learning (SEL), explored several SEL programs and identified a need to pilot some of these programs this year, and presented about self-care at staff meetings. Within the RBSD, staff were trained on trauma-sensitive schools and Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) last year as well.

AMHE goals for this year include choosing curriculum for K-12 social-emotional learning to be implemented in the 2020-21 school year and to continue to raise awareness and increase knowledge within staff and community members in regard to mental health and self-care.

Website Resources

Part of RBSD's AMHE mission is to provide our community with a pathway to mental health resources. One way that RBSD is accomplishing this is by utilizing the school website, which now contains a Mental Health Matters webpage. On this webpage, you can find more information on what mental health means, mental health screeners, and a list of community resources that are there to help those in need. Through the website links provided, individuals can screen themselves for a multitude of mental health conditions, including depression, anxiety, bipolar disorder, PTSD, alcohol/substance use, and more. After completing a screener, more information is provided based on your results.

Navigating to the Mental Health Matters webpage is simple. Go to the Rosendale-Brandon School District homepage. Under the "District" tab, you will find the "School Counseling" tab. Hover your mouse over the "School Counseling" tab and the option to select the "Mental Health Matters" page will appear. Once you are here, you can access all of the features listed in this article.

In the past few weeks, I have talked to many people that have had such positive experiences with Ron. My experiences with Ron and family began in the 60's.

Ron wore many hats in our community. His involvement with education was as a fifth grade teacher at Rosendale Elementary School. Then Ron became principal of Rosendale Intermediate School before becoming superintendent for the district.

Ron affected the lives of many students and parents in a positive way, including my three children. The community benefited from his involvement in the Rosendale Lions Club, of which he was a charter member in 1968. As president of the club, Ron took over the chairmanship in this community to raise funds for a needed heart transplant recipient, Brad Westenberg, who was an 8th grade student at Rosendale Middle School. The needed funds were raised and Brad received his new heart, but unfortunately it was rejected and Brad passed a short time later.

Our family lived next door to the Miltons for 25 years, and we have remained friends. We all miss his great sense of humor and the pranks he has played on friends and follow educators. I only know of a few because he was so good at not getting caught.

I know Ron's circle of friends was spread throughout the area with fellow educators. Raising, training and competing with Beagles in field trials was a great passion of his for years. It was a way for Ron to relax on some weekends, and he cherished the time spent with the fellow "Beaglers" from different parts of the state.

Ron's commitment to God, his country and his family was evident in his career and having been a dedicated marine. My family misses him as many others do.

My first acquaintance with Ron was when I was hired to become his Rosendale Middle School secretary in July of 1976. Ron had a great sense of humor and was a great practical joker, which I soon learned to go along with and "pull the wool over" many people's eyes. However, right before school was to start, I broke my leg playing softball. Ron was not happy and his sense of humor was not there having a secretary in a full leg cast and the extra burden it would put on him. However, 25 years later I was still his secretary and we had a very compatible working relationship. Over the years, I was victim to his many jokes – a person you'd never get "one up on." It made working with him a pleasure.

Seventeen years into my employment, Ron was chosen to become the District Administrator and I was honored to have him invite me to become his secretary in his new role. I believe we both missed contact with the kids. However, we did endure a district building referendum in four schools, surviving many stressful hours only to have our compatibility see us through with success.

He was a very trusting and wise man, teaching me so much about life, education, and kids. He was a very fair and straight forward man, respected by so many in the education world, as well as the community. Ron was a man who, no doubt, "walked his talk." It was an honor to have known and worked for such an admirable person.

As an employee of CESA 13/6, I worked directly with Mr. Ronald Milton for twenty years and was associated with him for over forty-five years. During the course of my thirty-five years with CESA, having worked in a total of twenty-three different school districts, I did not encounter a finer educator than Ronald Milton.

Ron Milton was a man of integrity and humility; kindness and caring were emblematic of how he lived. He was as trustworthy as can be and never willing to sacrifice the best interests of others to achieve his goals. In his manner and approach to the conduct of his responsibilities, he was absolutely consistent.

Ron had a clear vision of what he was about and what he was trying to accomplish. He did not hesitate to demonstrate leadership or to exercise authority but never in a self-serving manner and always with the intent to support his staff and to realize positive outcomes for his students. His commitment to the students and families of the Rosendale-Brandon School District was always in evidence and never in doubt.

I had the greatest of respect for Mr. Milton and so much positive regard for his professionalism and work ethic. Talk about a role model for all of us; couldn't find a better candidate, in my judgement. One of Ron's daughters labeled her father a great man; for me, this assessment as real merit. And so we offer tribute to this gracious gentleman for all that he contributed to the betterment of our lives.

For many years the Rosendale Brandon School District has enjoyed a reputation for having schools that provide a solid education. Many families tell us they move here, or School Choice their children here, because they feel we value the same things that they are looking for in a school: strong academics, a nice choice of extra-curricular opportunities and a commitment to providing an atmosphere that is welcoming to all. I am writing this not to brag, but to honor a man who was instrumental in instilling those values and working hard in the district for over 40 years to ensure the RBSD was always committed to them and getting better at them. His name was Ron Milton and he was my first boss when I arrived in 1998.

Ron was an ex-marine and loved to tell stories from his days in the service in the 50's. When he first began regaling me with his stories of and quotes from a general named Chesty Puller, I thought he was pulling my leg. I had to look him up and found he was one of the most decorated Marines in the history of the Corps. If you want a good laugh, or are feeling particularly patriotic, I highly suggest you Google "Chesty Puller Quotes." Ron obviously loved the man and what he stood for.

In our administrative meetings, what struck me most was Ron's commitment to family. Often during the years I worked with him, a teacher or custodian or other employee had some sort of problem occur with their health or their family that impacted the school's operation. Ron always said the same thing, "Family first." He understood that when we are at work but our mind is somewhere else worrying about a loved one, we are not doing the children the service they deserve. He instilled in me the need to take care of your employees beyond the school walls and to value their struggles outside of the buildings. That was not a concept I held when I first became an administrator.

The other areas that Ron stressed beyond family were service and patience. I think the Marines had a profound impact on him in those two areas. As a young administrator I was usually in a rush to "get things done." Ron generally laughed at my impatience and counseled me that if I was proposing something that would positively impact the children, then I should just stay the course and eventually it (whatever it happened to be) would happen. Only once do I recall him losing his patience with me and closing the door to remind me, in a manner any former Marine would appreciate, of the errors of my impatience.

As a superintendent Ron always kidded that he essentially only responsible for the 3 B's of school: Beans, Balls and Buses. At first I found this funny, but after several years of school board meetings I understood the truth of that quip. When parents get upset with the schools it is very often something to do with sports, transportation or lunch.

At the conclusion of every administrative meeting Ron led, he would ask, "What have we done for the children today?" It was important to him to remind us who we were there to serve, and to ask ourselves how we are improving the education and the lives of our children. It is something I still try to think about every day and in every meeting I have with children, their parents and my staff. Ron Milton was my boss, my friend and one of the most influential mentors I ever had, and I am honored to write about him. Our schools are all better because he served here.

How appropriate to be remembering Ron Milton. There are so many ways Ron was important to the Rosendale-Brandon School District, but perhaps one of the ways that was least known to the public was how hard he fought during the district's formative years. In fact, without Ron Milton there may well not have been a Rosendale-Brandon School District.

During my time as superintendent, for legal purposes I needed to study the archives to determine the original wording when the school district boundaries and the boundaries for school board member representation, be it Rosendale or Brandon, were created. It was during this research that I came across numerous petitions by citizens who wanted to withdraw from the newly forming district. Ron Milton was driving to Madison almost weekly to represent the new district regarding these petitions. While many citizens back in the late 60's wanted out, as demonstrated by today's open enrollment numbers, Rosendale-Brandon has become an attractive district with students joining from all of our neighboring districts. Without Ron Milton's steadfast watch, determination and fight, what has become of the Rosendale-Brandon School District may very well have not happened, and the area may have instead been absorbed by the surrounding districts.

To the district, Ron was instrumental in survival but on a personal level, Ron was my mentor, my inspiration, and above all, my friend.

I once read that "it is not an exaggeration to say that a great teacher can change a student's life." Additionally, although I do not recall the exact quote, I also read somewhere that when some teachers are asked why they chose teaching careers, they respond by claiming, ". . . If I can help just one student, I will consider my career successful." These two short quotes capture the essence of Mr. Milton's teaching career and his life-long dedication to his students.

I was in Mr. Milton's first class following his graduation from college. As a 6th grade elementary student who only had middle-aged women as teachers in my previous years, I was immediately awe-struck with his classroom demeanor, his appearance and his ability to control the activities within his classroom. In thinking back, he looked, acted and carried himself as a Marine in civilian attire. He had a close-cropped military-style haircut, was young and physically fit and had that undeniable military bearing. While he had a relaxed interacting teaching style and was well respected by his students, he also expected his students to act appropriately, complete homework assignments on time, etc. While everyone in his very first classroom likely believes we somehow helped mold Mr. Milton into the caliber of educator he became, we probably only accelerated the start of his gray hair. In looking back, he faced more challenges in that first year than most teachers do in their entire career.

Mr. Milton also taught me many things outside of the classroom. He taught me about trust and responsibility when he periodically asked me to care for his beloved purebred Beagles during weekends when he and his wife were away. He would simply tell me what he wanted me to do and then expected me to fulfill that responsibility and complete the tasks as instructed. He would often invite me to go with him when he trained and exercised his dogs in the local fields. I don't think we ever discussed school or homework, but he would listen and comment as I shared personal things with him and he subsequently taught me to trust in another person. He shared about his experiences as a Marine in the U.S. Marine Corps and even loaned me his coveted Marine Corps Boot Camp Book so I could review it at home for several weeks. I also recall that he even invited me to his home on one or two weekends to watch football games together and share a couple of pieces of his wife's world-famous homemade pies during the games.

The more I interacted with Mr. Milton, the more I learned and the more I wanted to be just like him. Following my high school graduation, I joined the United States Marine Corps as a way to follow in his footsteps. My interaction with Mr. Milton ultimately lead to a 14-year career in the Marine Corps, which lead to a 22-year career as a Special Agent of NCIS, followed by three years as a full-time college instructor and a seven-year career as a contract investigator with the Department of State. All because Mr. Milton took an interest in me.

While a student in Mr. Milton's class, I remember that my father passed away and the entire family was at the funeral home during the viewing. I did not care that family friends, my father's co-workers or associates came to pay their respects. I just kept watching and hoping that Mr. Milton would attend the viewing. When he finally arrived, he offered his condolences to the immediate family and then took me to a quiet area to talk to me in private for a short time. He was that kind of individual.

Throughout my adult life, I lived and worked extensively in foreign countries and routinely became friends with many DOD (Department of Defense) Teachers at the various overseas military installations. I would often bring Mr. Milton's name up in conversation and tell the group of educators what a great teacher and mentor he was. During a couple of those conversations, DOD teachers asked me if I ever told Mr. Milton what I thought about him. When I admitted I hadn't, they encouraged me to reach out to him, claiming Mr. Milton needed to hear it directly from me and that it would likely mean a lot to him.

Shortly after I retired from federal law enforcement, I kept thinking about the comments made by those DOD teachers and finally decided to call Mr. Milton and tell him direct how he impacted my life. I must admit that I was nervous as I dialed his number and even hung up once or twice to get my thoughts together before I redialed and contacted him. Once he answered the phone and I explained my recent retirement and the reason I called him, I told him that I wanted to tell him direct that he was the greatest influence in my life. As was his character, he simply listened and at the end told me he really appreciated hearing those comments from me. We ended up talking for several more minutes before I thanked him once again and we ended our conversation. I did what I had to do and I felt great following that conversation.

I would periodically call Mr. Milton while I was assigned overseas and also stopped to visit him during one of my latest trips to Wisconsin. After hearing of his passing, I felt good about altering my vacation schedule to ensure I made time to see and talk with him for a couple of hours. I hope he enjoyed it as much as I did.

It has been over 56 years since I was in his very first class, but to this day, I have never addressed him or referred to him as anything but "Mr. Milton" and never will. Even after the passage of that much time, I still have him placed on a pedestal and still look up to him.

I can only hope that those reading this have had similar experiences with one of their teachers and that at some point in their lives, they too make that all-important phone call to tell that teacher how they have had a positive impact on your life as well. I guarantee that you will feel better for having done so and the teacher may just realize that s/he "did" have a successful teaching career after all.

The Rosendale-Brandon School District is truly a great district and my friend Ron Milton should always be remembered for his honesty, foresight, and dedication in helping us to be where we are today. Whenever an issue arose and there were differing opinions, Ron would always say "What's best for the students?" In the Rosendale-Brandon School District, those words are words that we still live by and hopefully always will.

Ron's favorite saying used to be "no good deed shall go unpunished." In other words, no matter how hard you try to help someone it may come back to haunt you. Well, Ron, today I want to pay tribute to you for all of those good deeds anyway, and as a friend I also want to say thanks for the memories.
