The Next Step in the Process

In my December article, I shared that the District was in the process of partnering with a firm to help develop a Long-Range Facility Master Plan. The end goal is that we will have an all-encompassing master plan for facilities that aligns the District's current reality, strategic direction, and the community's desired future state of facilities. The Plan will be created with input from a stakeholders including staff, students, community members, business partners, and parents and will look to address the following elements:



- identify and address facility, safety, security, space utilization, and research-based educational appropriateness in an efficient and cost-effective manner
- modernize aging and inefficient facilities
- provide facilities that support student academic and extra-curricular achievement, contribute to college and career readiness, and support professional learning
- increase opportunities for independent, small group, and large group learning
- operate safe, energy-efficient facilities that facilitate learning in a sustainable

The design firm selection process involved reviewing written proposals from five different firms. The Board chose to invite two of those firms to a face-to-face interview. Following that interview, the Board voted to partner with Plunkett Raysich Architects, LLP (PRA) to create a Facility Master Plan. PRA has strong experience in education design and facility study. Attributes of the company that stood out during the selection process included their community-driven planning approach and their passion for creating quality teaching and learning spaces in a cost effective manner.

The next step in the process is that PRA will conduct facilities analysis and document their findings. They will complete a systems life span analysis, review building accessibility, and create prioritized, price-detailed maintenance lists for each facility. The analysis will help identify three categories of need. Critical needs should be addressed within one to two years; anticipated needs should be addressed in two to five years; and long-term needs should be planned for five or more years down the road.

While PRA is conducting this facilities analysis, they will also be completing an educational space analysis. This analysis will include establishing target and maximum capacities in our learning spaces, identifying current and potential space needs, and discussing current and future program needs.

I am excited to engage with PRA in this next step of this process and look forward to hearing from our staff, students and community as we continue to analyze our district needs. As always, I welcome your input and look forward to working with you as we plan for the future of the Rosendale-Brandon School District.

Monday, February 17th was President's Day. Originally a day established to honor President George Washington, it is now a day to honor all presidents past and present. It is a day that celebrates the strong leaders and influential individuals who have shaped our country. For the Rosendale Brandon School District, it is also a day that provides an opportunity for district staff to attend the Spring into Success Conference offered by CESA 6. District staff joined over 3000 individuals from 24 school districts to learn how to be effective leaders, how to motivate our students, and how to establish connections with our students and their families. These were just a few of the possible sessions the staff could elect to attend. Just as our staff is diverse in grade level and content areas, the sessions were varied, offering something for everyone.

Not only did the staff attend sessions at the Spring into Success Conference, four of our teachers were selected to present as well. Cindy Bailey, Sue Fellerer, Pam Mumm, and Linda Sattler volunteered to share their knowledge, experience, and skills at the conference. Cindy, Sue, and Pam are Library Media Specialists in the district. They are unique in their skill sets and responsibilities when compared to other districts. Gone are the days of the quiet library filled with books and reference materials for students to use. Instead, the library has become the hub of the school, offering not only traditional resources, but also things like digital literacy skills, multimedia, MakerSpaces, online resources and programs, classroom instruction and collaboration, and technology training, integration, trouble-shooting and problem-

Bailey, Fellerer and Mumm tapped into their warehouse of knowledge and presented "Groovy Googley Goodies" to over 200 participants in four sessions throughout the day. The presentation featured tips and tricks to save time, resources to help increase productivity, and opportunities to utilize the creative minds of both students and educators. The goal was to have every participant walk away with two to four ideas that they could immediately use in their classroom or with their students. Although we are not presidents (not yet anyway), the Library Media Specialists are leaders in the district, willing to share their knowledge and skills with peers from across the state. "Defend" Yourself by being "Anti" Virus Aware Tech Tip of The Month

Over the last few years, there have been some major stories regarding hackers, stolen data, and hijacking of and corruption of data that not only have affected personal computers, but also large companies and government agencies as well. Stories like Russian hackers stealing classified N.S.A (National Security Administration) materials, the leaking of data hacked from the C.I.A. to WikiLeaks, the harvesting of personal information by free antivirus software, and phishing scams targeting schools across the country (including Wisconsin) are just a few that have been in the news more and more often. This is scary stuff.

In an effort to help inform and educate our students, staff and community members, the RBSD Technology Committee has been writing articles regarding internet safety, protecting personal information, updating computers and programs, and now, how to protect your computer from Malware and other potentially dangerous programs. Although we cannot guarantee our tips and tricks will protect you from these harmful programs and situations, hopefully our articles will reduce the chances of an attack on your personal computer and information.

How do hackers target and attack computers? They create and use programs called Malware. Malware is a catch-all term for various malicious software, including viruses, adware, spyware, browser hijacking software, fake security software, and ransomware. Below are the definitions to help distinguish between the different types of Malware:

- <u>Viruses</u> potentially the most destructive can do anything from erasing the data on your computer to hijacking your computer to attack other systems, send spam, or host and share illegal content.
- <u>Spyware</u> collects your personal information and passes it on to interested third parties without your knowledge or consent. Spyware is also known for installing Trojan viruses.
- Adware displays pop-up advertisements when you are online.
- <u>Fake security software</u> poses as legitimate software to trick you into opening your system to further infection, providing personal information, or paying for unnecessary or even damaging "clean ups".
- <u>Browser hijacking software</u> changes your browser settings (such as your homepage and toolbars), displays pop-up ads, creates new desktop shortcuts, and share personal preferences to third parties.

How do you know if your computer has been attacked or infected by Malware? Some common signs include: browser crashes and instabilities, poor or slow system performance, advertising and popup windows both within the browser and when the browser is not open, new tabs in your browser pull up ads or an alternate homepage, search results return unrelated sites or ads for software and programs or applications do not launch or cannot be downloaded.

What can you do? In the past, it was recommended that users install antivirus software on their computers. Unfortunately, some of the antivirus programs have opened a "back door" to those conducting espionage, launching destructive attacks, and hijacking important data or personal information. Don't worry, there are antivirus programs that have been proven to be effective. One such program is Windows Defender. Windows Defender has been ranked as one of the top four performing programs by the independent IT security institute AV-TEST. One of the best things about Windows Defender is that it is free to Windows 10 users, whereas the other programs need a paid subscription. Some of the other top scoring programs include F-Secure Safe 17, Norton Security 22.17, and Kaspersky Internet Security 20, all of which have a subscription that will need to be purchased.

Being aware of the possible dangers online is the first step to protecting your information and keeping your computer safe. Updating your computer and browser, being aware of phishing scams, using unique passwords, being leery of attachments, usb drives, and downloads, and finally, installing antivirus software that has been deemed "top ranking" are all ways to protect you and your family while online.




