What inspired you to become a teacher

I never even thought of becoming a teacher as a child or young adult. My dad was a middle school science and math teacher, and I had absolutely no desire to do what he did! I didn't even enjoy the company of children! I went to college and earned a degree in business administration with a minor in marketing. I dabbled in the retail fashion industry buying market, bridal, and restaurant management over the next six years trying to find my niche. What's the most challenging part of your job?

When I have a student that doesn't make as much progress as I would have liked, I blame myself. When I see a student struggling and have tried every strategy I know of, I feel helpless. When I see a student that is being left out or just doesn't seem to fit in and have done what I can to remedy the situation, but they still seem so sad, I wonder night after night what else I can do to help. This becomes both mentally and physically exhausting.

What's the most rewarding part of your job?

The most rewarding part of my job goes hand in hand with the most challenging! I may not be able to meet every need of every student, but I am able to meet MANY needs of MANY students. This is an incredible feeling. When I receive an encouraging e-mail, letter, or message from a former student years after I've had them, this more than makes up for the exhaustion of trying to meet all the challenges that come with my job.

What's the most memorable moment you've had in the classroom?

One afternoon my students were being exceptionally squirrely. One boy was specifically challenging me by looking at his graphic novel as I was trying to teach social studies. 
