Academic Bowl 2021



On March 1, 2021, Laconia High School participated in the Flyway Conference Academic Bowl. This year, the event was hosted virtually by Lomira High School and each participating school hosted their own students in-person to administer the tests for the competition.

Academic Bowl is an academic contest in which each participant takes an individual written test, then competes as part of a team in an oral round of multiple choice questions. Before they participate on the math, science, social studies, language arts, or current events team in the oral round, students take an individual written test in one of the following subjects: Algebra 1, Geometry, Algebra 2, Advanced Math, General Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Geography, World History, U.S. History, U.S. Government, Grammar & Spelling, Poetry & Short Stories, American Literature, or British Literature.

The top two scorers on each individual test earn medals, and the school's team with the top combined score from all written and oral tests wins the Academic Bowl trophy for the year.

This year, Laconia earned 3rd Place in the Flyway Conference Academic Bowl! Our team also had four individual medalists: 1st Place Grammar & Spelling - Mattie Isaac; 2nd Place Geometry - Jada Jahn; 1st Place Physics - Colton Lovejoy; and 1st Place Algebra 1 - Brianna Pflum.
